BMCC CHORAL PROGRAM has a busy academic year. On October 6, as part of Education Partnerships Program at The Metropolitan Opera Guild, nearly 90 choral members were invited to attend the final rehearsal of Puccini's La Bohème. As one of the community partners to Perelman Performing Art Center, BMCC music students have performed four times since Fall semester in the lobby of the new performance space. PAC NYC Artistic Director Bill Rauch said, "these partnerships will invite and include our neighbors from all five boroughs, connect people across differences, and help us discover how art can continue to inspire and heal." In November, some of our choral members were invited to the premiere performances of Watch Night composed by Tamar-Kali, and co-conceived by Bill T. Jones and Marc Bamuthi Joseph. Watch Night fuses melodies rooted in spirituals, percussive breath, and fiery opera with the urgency of slam poetry and Bill T. Jones' dynamic staging to create an exploration of justice and forgiveness in the face of deadly rage. On Dec 17, BMCC Choral Program returned and sang with the Trinity Church (Wall Street) Choirs at their annual Holiday Concert. This was our second appearance in this holiday concert at the Trinity. This spring, eleven choral members of BMCC Chamber Singers showcased their talents before a live audience of millions when they performed as backup singers for the English singer-songwriting sensation Raye, during her musical guest appearance on the April 6 episode of Saturday Night Live (SNL) on NBC. These students sang backup as Raye performed her hit songs, Escapism and Worth It.

BMCC COLLEGE CHORUS was founded in the fall of 2017. College Chorus is open to all BMCC students who are interested in learning, rehearsing, and performing standard choral literature. Diverse works are explored from the great works of the past to the present day. College Chorus holds regular rehearsals on Tuesdays from 7-9:45 PM at Fiterman Hall Room F325.

BMCC CONCERT CHOIR, formerly Select Chorus, was founded in the fall of 2017. Concert Choir is designed for music major students who will study and perform repertoire from the Renaissance to the present day. Accompanied and a cappella compositions will be studied with an emphasis on proper blend, vowel placement, clear diction, and adherence to healthy vocal habits. Previously, Select Chorus functioned as a voluntary group; members participated in all scheduled activities without gaining any school credit. They loved the art of choral singing and shared what they learned with those who had a passion for music. Among all BMCC choral and music ensembles, Select Chorus had been the most praised and recognized. Their significant achievements included annual appearances at BMCC Honors Convocation and Commencement. In addition, Select Chorus participated at the CUNY Choral Festivals at York College and won consecutive first prizes in the Classical division in the spring of 2006 and 2007. They were also featured in the 2010 US Open with Gloria Estefan and the 9/11 Memorial for Recovery Workers on May 30, 2012. Since the establishment of the BMCC Music Majors Program, Select Chorus was reconstructed and transformed into the Concert Choir. In December of 2018 as part of the BMCC Community Ambassador Program, Concert Choir performed as the sole holiday singers at the UNIQLO on Fifth Avenue. Concert Choir holds regular rehearsals on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 4:30-5:45 PM at Fiterman Hall Room F325.

A Grand Night For Singing

On behalf of our 100 performers, I would like to welcome all of you to our Spring 2024 annual choral concert. BMCC Choruses are known for their global repertoire. At each concert, we feature diverse themes of choral music. To name a few, for our spring concert of 2009, If Music Be the Food of Love, Sing On, we performed songs involving food and music; spring of 2010, Songs of Celebration and Commemoration featured songs from the East and West; spring of 2015, Choral Mosaic featured well-known music related to the letter M, including Mozart's Vespers, music about music, music with movement, and music celebrating the Mexican flair of Cinco de Mayo; fall of 2015, Carols, Lullabies & Gloria about a world of Christmas, from Susa's Southwestern Spanish flavor carols to standard classic Vivaldi's Gloria; fall of 2016, Of War and Peace included joint concerts with the Hunter College Chorus about a choral solemn meditation featuring Haydn's Mass in Time of War, Britten's Agnus Dei from War Requiem, Ortega's El Pueblo Unido; fall of 2017, The World in Music took us to another musical horizon of total diversity including Forrest's Jubilate Deo sung in seven different languages; and spring and fall of 2019, Songs of Diversity, Inclusion, Acceptance and Belonging (chapters one and two), included David's Zuni Sunrise Song from the Pueblo Indians, Narverud's Kuimba Nafsi Yangu in Swahili, Dobrogosz's Mass in jazz style, Basler's Gloria from Missa Kenya, and two commissioned choral compositions, Together Now and We Are Everywhere by Profs. Quentin Angus and Can Olgun for the Virtual Choir Project, as part of The Diversifying CUNY's Leadership: A CUNY-Harvard Consortium (2019-2020) program.

Tonight's program is part of our in-person choral concert series after Covid, which began with Here Comes the Sun (Fall 2021). This series features songs embarking a new journey for our music students as we returned to Fiterman Hall for in-person sessions after the 18 months distance learning. The Fall 2021 program focused on determination and endurance we built throughout the pandemic, including Fischer' Bonse Aba and Beck's arrangement Don't Give Up on Me; about our friendship that grew stronger as we continued making beautiful choral music in one unified voice, including Longford's arrangement Goin' Home & Hayes' One Song; and about thanksgiving and gratitude, including Warren's arrangement Joyful, Joyful. The program in Always Something Sings (Spring 2022) was about the joy and passion for choral singing, featuring Tate's One Million Voices, Robinson's arrangement How Can I Keep from Singing? Whitacre's Sing Gently, Hogan's I'm Gonna Sing 'til the Spirit Moves in my Heart; Nunez's We are The Voices; and Chilcott's A Little Jazz Mass. The program in We Shall Overcome (Fall 2022), through a variety of socially and culturally responsive songs, is another level of celebration of diversity. Repertoires included A Safe Place to Stay (by Sarah Bareilles) speaks about the challenges that immigrants face with increasing border apprehensions; Stand Up (by Cynthia Erivo from film Harriet) about overcoming obstacles and kindness for others; What About Us (by Pink) about the pain of many Americans who feel abandoned and unheard today; Say Her Name (by Alysia Lee) about movements resisting police brutality against Black women; and Can You Hear Me? (by Thomas Hewitt Jones) about the loneliness and despair felt by many around the world during the Covid 19 pandemic. The program in Hope Is the Thing with Feathers (Spring 2023) featured songs tributed to the soaring feathered flocks in the skies. Their fearless flights symbolize messages of hope, peace, and renewal. Repertoire included Forrest's arrangement of The Nightingale, Gibbon's The Silver Swan, Scandello's Ein Hennlein Weiss, John Lennon & Paul McCartney's Blackbird, Jimme Thomas' Rockin' Robin, Luboff's Yellow Bird, Hagenberg's Measure Me, Sky & Arensen's Flight Song. The core selection for the program was three compositions by Christopher Tin. Both The Saddest Noise and Hope is the Thing with Feathers are from his latest work, The Lost Birds, a musical memorial to bird species driven to extinction by humankind. Sogno di Volare (The Dream of Flight) is the official musical theme of Sid Meier's video game Civilization VI. The World of Colors: You are Enough (Fall 2023) featured songs about colors representing the diversity of the world. Song selections are divided into four parts – warm colors including Memley's original work O May Luve's Like a Red, Red Rose, Shaw's arrangement of Orange Colored Sky and Brymer's arrangement of Yellow Submarine; cool colors including McBride's original work Green Green, Emerson's arrangement of Blue Skies, Dilworth's arrangement of The Color Purple, and Beck's arrangement of Green Eggs and Ham; neutral colors including Nichel's arrangement of Shine On, Silver Moon, Thomas' original work Walk the Streets of Gold, and Shaw's arrangement of The Pink Panther; and mixed colors including Greg and Steve's original The World is a Rainbow, Pinkzebra's original work I See Colors, and Hayes's arrangement of Over the Rainbow. The core of the program is You are Enough: A Mental Health Suite by Aron Accurso. This work "is intended to elevate conversations regarding mental health".

Tonight program, A Grand Night for Singing (Spring 2024) features songs well-known songs from stage and screen. It highlights songs from operas including Humming Chorus from Puccini's Madama Butterfly; Bridal Chorus from Wagner's Lohengrin and March of the Toreadors from Bizet's Carmen; songs from musicals including 42nd Street from 42nd Street; And all That Jazz from Chicago; and songs from Disney animation movies including Be our Guest from Beauty and The Beast; How Far I'll Go from Moana; Hallelujah from Shrek; and Remember Me from Coco; and songs from the cinema including O Fortuna from The Omen; Gabriel's Oboe from The Mission; Come What May from Moulin Rouge; and Conquest of Paradise from 1492: Conquest of Paradise.

To conclude this concert, our choristers will perform Lojeski's arrangement of *Do You Hear the People Sing* from *Les Misérables*, and Huff's arrangement of *A Million Dreams* from *The Greatest Showman*, in addition to two BMCC Choral Traditional Theme Songs, Paulus's *The Road Home*, and Dickau's *If Music be the Food of Love*, sending all of you off with much love and promises, and reminding you that BMCC is your designated choral home.
